


## IMPRESSIONIST AND MODERN ART LONDON, FEBRUARY 2020

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Sotheby's Evening sale carried the lowest presale estimate since 2009, and, while realizing £49.9 M against a £41.8 M - £59.6 M estimate, with just four lots going unsold; this Evening sale was down by 36.7% against laste year. Sotheby's relied he avily on three works that had been looted by the Nazis and restored to Gaston Lévy, including the highest estimated lot this year: an £8 M - £12 M neo-Impressionist Camille Pissarro painting of peasants working in a field. The true surprise of the night was Franz Marc's Zwei Blaue Esel which sold +240% above its low estimate to surpass the £4M mark. Unlike the recently returned pieces, this work on paper had been in the same private collection for over a century. Remarkably, on this occasion, Sotheby's sale did not include a single work by Picasso, who has been the mainstay of the Impressionist and Modern market for years. Furthermore, this slim sale didn't hold a separate Surrealist auction for the first time, including just a few Surrealist lots rolled into the main sale. It's worth mentioning that when the catalog was printed, there was only one guarantee, (for Pissarro's view of Le Pont Royal); but at the beginning of the sale, another nine lots had been guaranteed by third parties—a now-classic last-minute rush by speculative dealers to share any profits to be had. After this slim 33-lot sale, Phillip Hook, Sotheby's longstanding senior director of Impressionist and Modern art in London, announced his retirement.

Christie's Evening sale was much brighter, doubling Sothe by's haul with a total of £107 M (including the Surrealist sale). Of the 25 lots offered in the main sale, all but 5 sold, yielding a BI rate of 20%. Still, three works sold for over £10m. Two of the sale's most spirited bidding wars came early in the sale Gefährliche Straße by George Grosz quickly climbing to its final price of £9.7M and the night's second top lot Tamara de Lempicka's 1932 Portrait de Marjorie Ferry going for £16.3 M, the last breaking once again the record for the artist set last November. An overpriced Cezanne from 1904 sold +50% above its low estimate for a final £2.6M went unexpected. While four still lifes by Picasso weren't so lucky didn't achieve their low estimates, and even one of them being BI.
